#### What is Early Head Start Home Visiting?

Eastern Washington University's Early Head Start home visiting program is a high quality school readiness program that provides weekly home visits and socialization opportunities to

eligible pregnant women, infants and toddlers, ages birth-to-three, who live in Ferry, Stevens and Pend Oreille counties (locally called the *Tri-Counties*).

Children and families live in small towns and in sparsely populated frontier areas that are under-resourced and underserved. Families travel 30 minutes to 2 ½ hours for groceries, health, developmental




and social services. Often services for infants and toddlers are simply non-existant in the Tri-Counties, regardless of family income.

To reach the children and families in this remote service area, EWU Early Head Start operates a home visiting model that brings weekly early education, health and developmental services to each family's home. Home visitors, called Parent-Child Educators, live and work in the communities they serve and are supported by a team of well-qualified, experienced program managers and consultants who have expertise in:

- Early childhood education, development and disabilities
- Prenatal and postpartum health
- Infant and toddler health, oral health and infant mental health
- Nutrition and feeding, and
- Social and family services.

#### Where does EHS provide services?

The EWU Early Head Start service area covers 6,000 square miles of Ferry, Stevens, and Pend Oreille counties in northeast Washington State, bordered to the north by Canada and to the east by the Idaho panhandle. These counties are federally designated frontier areas and medically underserved areas. Only five towns have populations over 1,000 and no communities in the Tri-Counties has a population of more than 5,000 citizens.

This innovative and highly successful school readiness program, funded through a five-year, \$9.4 million federal grant from the Office of Head Start, *engages and equips parents as they help their children be healthy, well and ready for Success in School.* 


EWU EHS is accomplishing its overall school readiness goal of assuring that each enrolled child is either:

- Developing as expected in all 5 essential domains for their age (adjusted for prematurity); or
- Receiving additional developmental evaluations and services (i.e. inclusive and individualized




curriculum and experiences) for each domain in which the child needs development.

#### Infants and Toddlers are On Track for Success in School!

- Program data show that children are on track for success in school even when they are experiencing multiple risk factors like disability, neglect, homelessness and when they live in households where the families basic needs are not met.
- Infants and toddlers are making progress and accomplishing their individual health, nutrition and developmental goals.
- Foster children and children with disabilities are being served at extremely high rates and are getting the services they need to optimize their development.

- Engaging parents in planning and carrying out individualized learning experiences with their child;
- Empowering families to obtain early intervention services; and
- Equipping parents to advocate for their child's health and developmental needs.

#### Living and Raising Families in the Tri-Counties



The Tri-Counties of northeast Washington are abundant in scenic beauty and natural resources.

But the abundant natural resources do not equate to abundant socio-economic resources for families.

The Tri-Counties make-up the poorest region in the State of Washington, with citizens experiencing the highest rates of unemployment and lowest per capital incomes. The area is under-resourced and under-served, suffering from inadequate and inaccessible services, geographic isolation.

#### Parents Embracing their Unique and Vital Roles in their Children's Lives

Without a robust medical, developmental, employment and educational infrastructure to plug into, parents in the Tri-Counties have bigger challenges than many to provide for their child's health and development and to help them be prepared for Success in School.

EHS Parents embrace their roles as their child's First and Most Inflential Teacher, Primary Nurturer and Best Advocate! They work together in parent-child socializations and the EWU Early Head Start Policy Council to create the change they want for their children!

#### **Data-informed Quality Improvements to Support School Readiness**

Quality improvements EWU Early Head Start has made in response to aggregated school readiness data:

- 1. Implemented new parent-child literacy program including Book-A-Month infanttoddler curriculum
- 2. Implemented Parents As Teachers *Interactions Across Abilities* disabilities curriculum to enrich the developmental experiences of children with delays
- Implemented an enhanced transition curriculum to better fill-the-gap that many families experience between the end of Early Head Start and the

beginning of kindergarten.

- 4. Created Well Child Birthday Packets that include books and toothbrushes at ages 1, 2 and 3 and information to help parents make the most of their children's Well Child medical exams.
- 5. Increased home visitor's family engagement skills
- Expanded home visitor's child development knowledge
- 7. Increased home visitor's access to



managers with child development and disabilities expertise

- 8. Implemented Practice-Based Coaching. Each home visitor has an individual coach and receives intensive coaching designed to address their specific needs.
- 9. Improved quality and effectiveness of home visits as evidenced by improved Home Visit Observation Rating Scale (HVORS) scores.

10.Implemented EWU EHS career ladders to promote staff retention.
